German Chocolate Crunch Cake

1 -German chocolate cake mix

1 can-Eagle brand Sweetened condensed milk

1 jar-Caramel ice cream topping

1 small carton-Cool Whip

1 package -Toffee bits

Bake in 9 x 13 inch pan.

Bake cake mix as directed on the package. After baking, cool slightly. With a spoon, poke a generous amount of holes in the top of cake. Pour the condensed milk over entire cake and then pour the jar of caramel topping over the top of the cake. Put the cool whip over this and spread. Generously sprinkle the toffee bits over the top of cool whip. Refrigerate at least 4 hours or overnight.

Tech Notes

HYDROGEN AS AN ALTERNATIVE FUEL

The technical session at the Waco rally was chaired by GMC Classics member **Ken Rose**. The topic of the discussion was about possible alternative methods of powering our vehicles. This was a very timely subject considering the increase in the cost of gasoline. The discussion touched briefly on the hybrid technology that is currently available on certain vehicle models that are built by a number of automobile manufactures. However, it quickly focused on the potential of hydrogen to power the internal combustion engine.

The theory of hydrogen fuel cell technology to create electricity is well known, if not well understood, by many of us. Much research is going into developing this technology so that it can be used to provide onboard power to a new generation of electric vehicles that are not limited to the relative short range of those few that are in service today.

But, can hydrogen be used to generate all of the power that is necessary to operate the internal combustion engine in existing vehicles? While it *is* possible to do that, the level of difficulty is beyond the capability of the majority of us. Hydrogen systems that produce quantities that are sufficient to power an internal combustion engine are understandably more complex in design. These systems require rather complicated electronic circuitry;

and the more advanced systems require an inverter to supply much higher voltages.

However, it is possible to construct a device which will raise the efficiency of an engine that burns gasoline. This device, called a 'booster', is relatively inexpensive to construct; and, the level of difficulty is much more in line with the ability of those who do the maintenance and upgrades to their own vehicles. The 'booster' creates a hydrogen/oxygen gas mix (called 'hydroxy'gas) which is drawn into the air intake and combined with outside air as it enters the engine. The 'hydroxy' gas enhances combustion of the fuel, maximizing the use of the available energy. Some of the benefits of this more complete burning of fuel are a smoother running, more powerful engine which emits fewer harmful exhaust emissions. This process also improves gas mileage; and, that is what creates the most interest in the 'booster' device. An improvement in gas mileage of 33% might be realistic. However, a wide range of results is experienced with the different 'booster' designs on a variety of vehicles.

The specifics of 'booster' design are not discussed here since there are several different types. For those who are interested in learning more about this subject, there are several Internet sites that provide very detailed information regarding the design of hydrogen 'boosters'.

Keep in mind that these devices are not toys. They create a hydrogen/oxygen gas mix ('hydroxy' gas) that is highly explosive. No suggestion is made or implied that anyone build one of these devices; and, anyone who does so is proceeding at his/her own risk.
