The scenic appeal of the park, the level concrete sites and excellent club room with its unforgettable Texas-sized overhead fan were all top-tier. As many of you know, the equipment trailer has an accumulation of items that are no longer used. At the Weatherford Executive Committee Meeting, Wagonmasters Jerry Reeves and Boyd Mooney recommended identification and removal of those items. Redonia Harper, Billie Young and I agreed to work with Jerry and Boyd to get this done at Whispering Pines. As all of the equipment in the trailer is collectively owned by GMC Classics members, individual members attending the Whispering Pines Rally will have the opportunity to buy surplus items of interest during the swap meet time with proceeds accruing to the Classics treasury.

Continuing thanks to Janie and Dennis Johnston for their stewardship of the defibrillation equipment. They planned to become certified to teach CPR and the application of the equipment during July. Janie, a practicing registered nurse, and Dennis, a retired wildlife enforcement officer, both have experience in this field. Some Classics members attended a certification class at the combined Classics/GMCMI convention at Shawnee, OK. With some of them volunteering to work with Janie and Dennis, Classics members should be in good hands in the event of an emergency requiring CPR and/ or defibrillation. At the Weatherford rally, Janie and Dennis placed the equipment in the clubroom where it would be readily accessible if needed. It is important that the location of the equipment be noted "by whoever has the microphone" during welcoming remarks. Please do not allow this to be overlooked.

Elsewhere in this newsletter, there are proposed changes to the GMC Classics Standing Rules. Please review the document (changes are in *bold/italic*) and be prepared to vote on it at the business meeting at Whispering Pines.

Chocolate-Covered Cherry Cake

Cake by **Charlotte Alumbaugh** at the Weatherford rally. Thanks Charlotte!

- 1 box Devil's food cake mix (18.25 oz)
- 1 can Cherry pie filling (21 oz)
- 2 Large Eggs
- 1 Teaspoon Pure almond extract

Place cake mix, cherry pie filling, eggs and almond extract in large mixing bowl. Blend with mixer for 1 minute. Stop mixer and scrape down sides of bowl. Increase mixer speed and beat 2 more minutes.

Place in 13 x 9 baking pan lightly greased. Place on center rack in preheated 350 degree oven. Bake 30 to 335 minutes. Cool cake and add glaze to warm cake.

Chocolate Glaze

1 cup Sugar

1/3 cup Butter 1/3 cup Whole milk

1 Pkg. (6 oz 1 cup) Semi -sweet chocolate chips

Place sugar, butter and milk in a sauce pan over medium-low heat and cook, stirring constantly until mixture comes to a boil. Boil for 1 minute stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in chocolate chips. When the chips have melted and the glaze is smooth, pour it over the warm cake so it covers the entire surface. The glaze will be thin but will firm up. Sprinkle chopped pecans on top if you so desire.

Everyone who ate it at the rally seemed to have enjoyed it. It was a very moist, delicious cake.

GMC Classics Tech Notes

This record of the Tech Notes is presented as a service to GMC Classics members and guests. Accuracy is not guaranteed. Independent verification is urged.

I was pleasantly surprised when Billy Massey informed me that Tom Landis would be willing to lead a Tech Session on the subject of in-dash air conditioners at the Oak Creek Rally.

The surprise, on my part, was that I hadn't considered that many of our members are multifaceted and not just onetrick pony's. Tom, as you will remember, led a session last year on "electrical trouble shooting" at the New Braunfels Rally.

I believe all of us have felt that our in-dash air conditioners could stand a lot of improvement. However, no one is anxious to take on the apparent chore of having to dig into that, hard-to-get-to unit, maybe, even having to remove the grill to access the unit.

Tom's success, in my view, was two- fold. He didn't remove the grill, not even the radiator bottle. He removed only the panel directly behind the bottle and slightly above, and he didn't tackle under the dash, inside. Still making major improvements. After removal of the panel and checking for any debris in the cavities, he installed two 12 volt DC biscuit fans. He first secured the damper that puts the unit in the re-circulating mode. (keeping outside air from coming in.) Then he mounted one of the fans in the intake cavity with two sheet metal screws, followed by the fastening of the other fan with tie wraps to the condenser coils. Tom stated that if he were to do it again, he would mount two fans side-by-side at this location to further increase the air flow. He powered these fans by connecting to the same wire that operates the regular AC fan. The fans, to coin a phrase, all suck. The intake fan pulling air from the inside of the coach and the fan or fans at the condenser. Pulling air across the condenser, and out through the ductwork. (Fans available from Granger part #2R2H9) This improved the efficiency of the unit considerably.

He stated that these air conditioning units are very robust and are the equivalent of a ton and a half or 18,000 BTU. He also blocked the outside air intake. Further confirming that it is, now recirculating only, winter or summer.

The next step reminded us that the AC unit is located in one of the hottest spots under the hood, scant inches above the radiator. So he proceeded to put half-inch foam board on every exposed portion of the unit that he could, especially the bottom. He used insulated aluminum foil in areas that were too tight to use the thicker foam board.

Finally, he suggested if you haven't already replaced the vacuum heater valve, you should replace it with a manual one. I f that vacuum valve is not working properly, you've got the AC "fighting the heater" and the AC "will lose."

Not to diminish the work done on this job, but it is done without a major expenditure (fans about \$30.00 each ... so maybe \$90.00).

Summarizing, much improved airflow and a big reduction in the effect of under the hood heat. I'd say a pretty good accomplishment. Tom's video shots and the actual use of a '76 GMC unit made for a very informative session! Thanks Tom!
